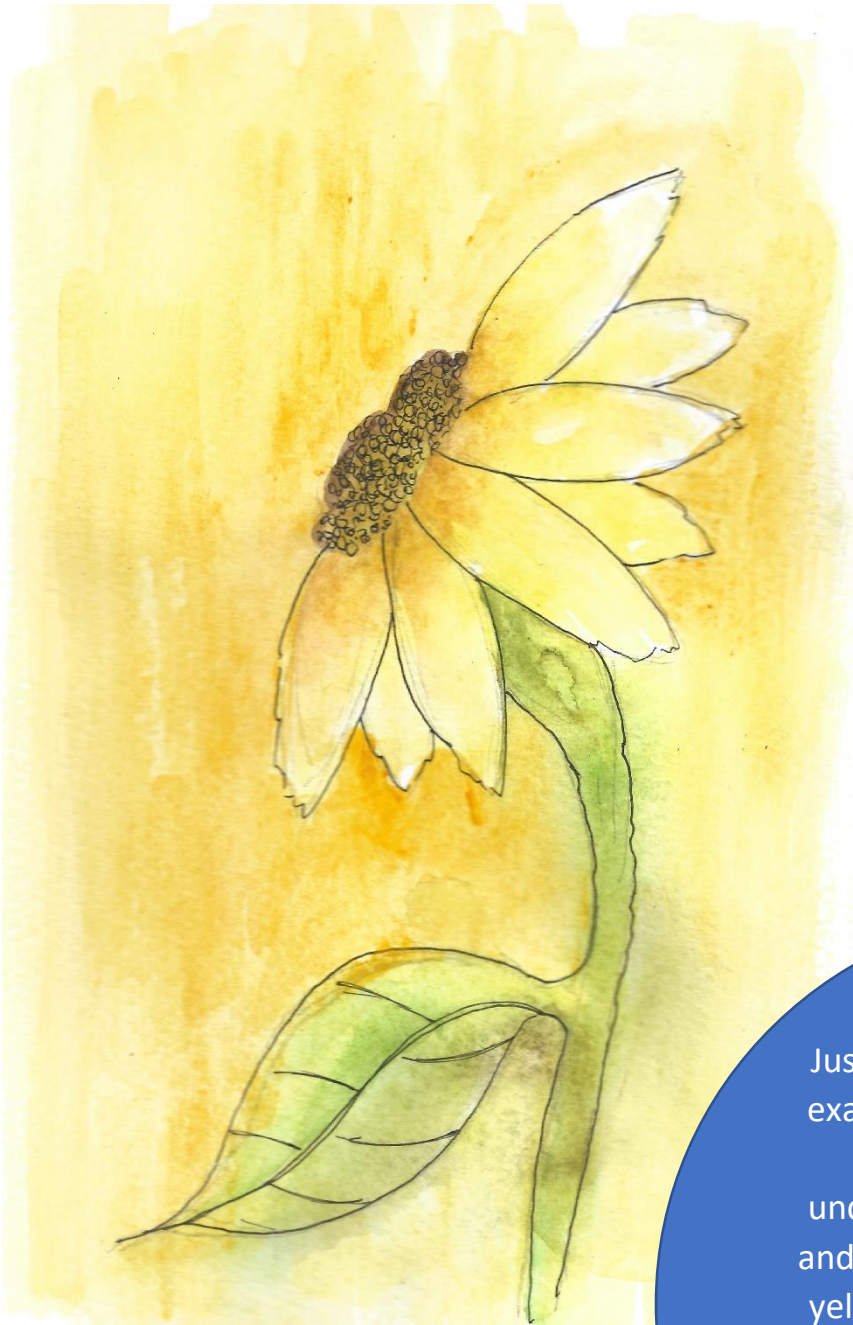


My finished Sunflower example:



Just like in Van Gogh's Sunflower example on page 1 and the green monochromatic painting underneath, I used mostly yellow and added a mixture of green with yellow for the stem – I wanted to keep my piece realistic but still focused on the colour yellow. Mixing the green with yellow creates a different variation of colour.

Monochromatic Colour

Monochromatic means containing 1 colour or variations of 1 colour.

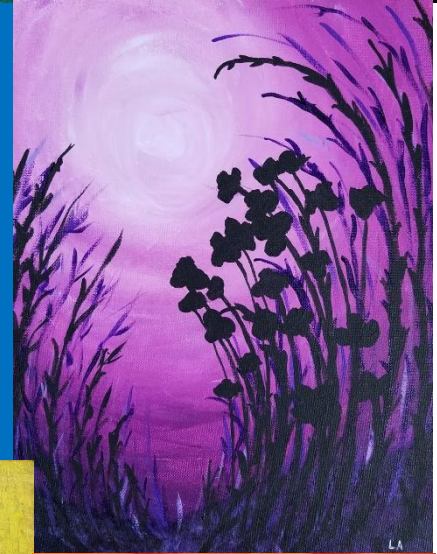
Step 1:
Choose a colour



(step 2) Idea 1: you might want to create a list of all things that relate to your chosen colour. This will help you choose a multiple of things to draw if you want to create a pattern.

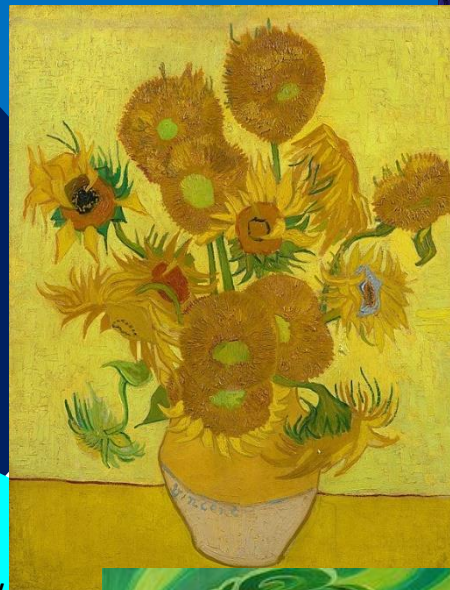
Yellow: bees, sunflowers, sun, happy, pencils, cheese, lemons, honey, sand

Blue: rain, sky, paint, water, ice, winter, cold, sea, blue whale



(step 2) Idea 2:
to choose 1 image (object, person for example)

Step 3: Get all your supplies ready, choose what you want to use – felt tips, paint, crayon. Remember to keep to your colour theme.



Step 5: Using any supplies you have available, colour your piece of art, stick to your colour theme to create a monochromatic piece.

Step 4: Draw your outline

Tip you can use white or black to darken and lighten areas if you want to.
